MCDPs Present 18th Annual Benitia Humanitarian Award

On February 16, the Missionary Catechists of Divine Providence will honor Martha Tijerina with the 2007 Benitia Humanitarian Award. Known in San Antonio as the first lady of Spanish television, Ms. Tijerina has worked for 30 years to increase public awareness of community needs and resources through her popular television shows and her tremendous fundraising activities.

Since the 1930's the Missionary Catechists of Divine Providence (MCDP) have dedicated themselves as a congregation to apostolic works and to proclaiming the Word to all people, especially the poor and marginalized. The Community's founder, **Sister Mary Benitia Vermeersch, CDP**, for whom the award is named, said "Good is never done except at the expense of those who do it." The community, made up primarily of women of Hispanic heritage, has served the poor and neglected throughout Texas and the southwest United States for more than sixty years.

All proceeds from the Benitia Humanitarian Award Dinner benefit the Benitia Family Center on the west side of

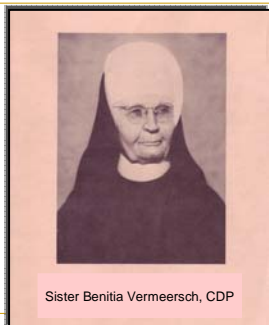

San Antonio. The MCDPs founded this center in 1994 to empower the poor and neglected, especially Hispanics, by enabling them to reclaim their personal and family values and self-worth in light of their culture and religious beliefs.



The first Benitia Humanitarian Award was given in September 1989. The award honors a person or persons who exhibit the values Sr. Benitia modeled during her lifetime. The Congregation recognizes the honoree as a special person who is dedicated to caring for those who are in need, both spiritually and materially.

Sister Benitia, a member of the Congregation of Divine Providence of San Antonio, Texas, founded the Missionary Catechists of Divine Providence in Houston, Texas in 1930 in order to meet the material and spiritual needs of the refugees who fled from Mexico during the revolution of 1910-1936. The MCDP Congregation continues Benitia's legacy through their

ministry, charity, and work with social services in the community. The community now ministers in five states, Arizona, California, Nebraska, New Mexico, and Texas.

The uniqueness of the MCDP's is found in the spirit with which they minister. As a religious congregation of bilingual/bicultural religious women, its members have the ability to bridge cultures and become avenues of communication in a Church that is mostly Hispanic. Coming from poor *barrios* themselves, the MCDP Sisters know what it means to be marginalized; they understand firsthand the struggles of the economically poor to access services needed to advance.

MCDPs serve as role models and mentors to the local Hispanic population who struggle to advance in education, as well as in the economic ladder of society. The Sisters are able to bridge the cultural and language differences which are often an obstacle to other church leaders as they strive to meet the needs of the Hispanic population. Their ministries encompass the following: Hispanic Ministry, catechesis, youth ministry, soup kitchens, seminaries, chaplaincy at hospitals, and social services at the private and state level.

Sisters of Providence, Kingston

December 2006 marked the 145th anniversary of the founding of the Sisters of Providence in Kingston. The Community offered praise and thanks to God for the many years of committed service to God's people in Canada, Guatemala and Peru. They also thank God for the valiant women who gave of their lives for the most vulnerable of society.



The Congregation's heritage is rooted in the creativity and spirituality of Vincent de Paul and Louise de Marillac, and the responsiveness of the Montreal Sisters of Providence to the call of Bishop E.J. Horan, as well as in the courage and pioneer spirit of Mother Mary Edward McKinley and the original members of the Kingston community. We trust in God's loving guidance as we continue to serve with compassion, trust in Providence and walk in hope.

Sisters of Divine Providence Elect New Leadership

At the November 2006 Chapter of Elections, the Congregation of the Sisters of Divine Providence, Marie de la Roche Province, elected its new Provincial Leadership Team. **Sister Mary Francis Fletcher** will be Provincial Director and **Sister Barbara McMullen** will serve as Assistant to the Provincial. Councillors are **Sisters Marilyn Bergt, Maria Fest, Lisa Paffrath, Ann Pairn, and Carol Stenger**. The team took office in January 2007 for a term of five years. They will be headquartered in the Marie de la Roche Center at Providence Heights in Allison Park, Pa.



The Marie de la Roche Province, named for the co-founder of the congregation, was formed in 2001 through the restructuring of the Kingston (Massachusetts), Pittsburgh, and St. Louis provinces, the region of Puerto Rico and a mission in Santo Domingo. There are 277 Sisters and more than 193 Associates in the province. In addition to the Marie de la Roche Province, the Congregation of the Sisters of Divine Providence ministers in Germany, Korea, Peru and Poland.

Project BandAID



Through a project known as BandAID, the La Roche College Community and the Sisters of Divine Providence, Marie de la Roche Province, were able to supply St. Mary's Academy in New Orleans with new band instruments. The project was undertaken by **Sister Marilyn Bergt, CDP**, former coordinator of community service at La Roche (now on the province Leadership Team). The project made it possible to send a complete set of instruments for the St. Mary's Academy New Orleans 50-person marching band. Since many of the upper class students were evacuated from New Orleans after Katrina and have not yet returned, the school had to start anew with younger students.

Sister Greta Jupiter, president of St. Mary's Academy, was very appreciative. The project illustrated the kinds of collaborative things the staffs of the Catholic High Schools are doing to heal and move on from the personally devastating effects of Katrina so they can better serve their students.

CDPS Adopt New Community Symbols

Vowed members and Associates of the Sisters of Divine Providence received new symbols at the Chapter of Affairs in August. The profession symbol for the vowed members, which can be worn as a pin or a necklace, is a burnished silver triangle with three interlocking circles. The triangle traditionally symbolizes the mutual, dynamic inter-relatedness of the Triune God. The open interlocking circles represent the provident nature of God who invites us to co-create in love, redeems us with compassion, who calls us to bless by inclusive hospitality. Sisters wear the symbol as a reminder of their communal commitment to make God's Providence more visible in the world.



The Associate symbol is a trefoil or a type of Celtic knot that has a long history of signifying the Trinity and God's Providence. The trefoil is in royal blue, the color of the dress worn by Marie de la Roche in a formal portrait, and for the color associated with Mary the Mother of God. The earth is enclosed in an open trefoil. The trefoil symbolizes the Triune God that we call Providence. God's Providence is made visible through acts of justice and compassion, and through an inclusive hospitable presence. Associates of the Sisters of Divine Providence wear the symbol as a sign of their commitment to God's Providence in the world. CDP Sisters Reaffirm Commitment to Promote a Consistent Ethic of Life

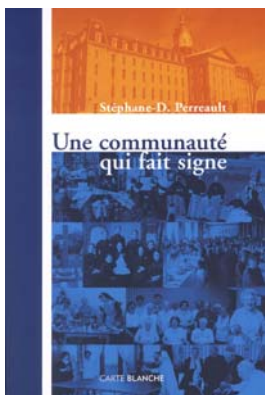
In August 2006, more than 200 Sisters of Divine Providence from across the continental United States, Puerto Rico and Santo Domingo participated in the Chapter of Affairs for the Marie de la Roche Province. At this year's Chapter, the Sisters confirmed anew their commitment to promote a consistent ethic of life. The Sisters, reflecting God's compassionate care for the world, are called to hold all life sacred, to promote justice, to seek to advance the cause of all people, especially those in need, and to practice responsible stewardship.

The Community promotes a consistent ethic of life through its corporate sponsored ministries: Providence Connections, Inc., which operates the Providence Family Support Center, Providence Day Care South and Amelia House (a SAFE house in Clarion County); Room at the Inn in St. Louis serves the homeless, providing programming and safe day/night sites for clients and their children; La Posada Providencia in Texas works with asylum seekers, guiding them through the U. S. immigration process. Their educational ministries -- Providence Heights Alpha School, the Sacred Heart School System, La Roche College and Camp Mishannock -- instill Gospel values in young people who will be the leaders of tomorrow. The Divine Providence Retreat Ministry (Kearns Spirituality Center, Providence Villa, Transfiguration House of Prayer) offers opportunity for spiritual renewal.

In addition, Sisters and Associates work for justice daily by serving on committees such as Pennsylvanians Against the Trafficking of Humans (PATH), participating in Operation Safety Net, a local group that serves the homeless of Pittsburgh, and holding a weekly Witness for Peace event at Providence Heights. They minister in area non-profits, serving the most vulnerable among us. They volunteer as tutors, mentors, foster parents and caregivers.

In prayer and deed, the Sisters of Divine Providence commit themselves to the protection of life through the eradication of war, poverty, racism, abortion, capital punishment and euthanasia.

Sisters of Providence, Montreal



A new book has been written about the Sisters of Providence in Montreal. It is entitled, in French, *Une communauté qui fait signe*, (*A Community that Signs*) *Sisters of Our Lady of Seven Dolors, 1887-2007*.

This group of Sisters is a diocesan congregation in Montreal, whose General Superior is our Sister of Providence General Superior. The SPs operated the Montreal Institution for Deaf Girls from 1851 – 1978, throughout its various stages of development. From this school came young women who wanted to give their lives to God as Sisters. In later days, not all who entered the community were students at the school.

The author, Stéphane D. Perreault, presented the book at a launching on January 19th, at the Sisters of Providence International Centre, Montreal. Currently, the book is available only in French. It will be translated into English and Spanish at a later date.

Sisters of Providence of Saint Mary-of-the-Woods Begin Associates Program

Sixty-two candidate-associates participated in a one-day orientation with their sister-companions as they begin the 11-month process of becoming Providence Associates of the Sisters of Providence of Saint Mary-of-the-Woods, Ind. They chose one of three dates and locations for the November and December orientation sessions.

There was a wonderful spirit among all of those who came together, most of whom were meeting one another for the first time. The day included time for introductions, welcome and getting acquainted, followed by morning prayer with a visit and word from Saint Mother Theodore (a.k.a. **Sister Ann Casper** or **Sister Susan Paweski**).

Sister **Mary Alice Zander**, director, gave an overview of the program which included the presentation of the seven Spiritual Integration Units, which each participant received and which will become the focus of the candidate-associate and companion meetings. In the afternoon, the candidate-associates

and companions met to do some planning for their times of meeting together. At each of the orientation sessions, sisters in the area joined in the blessing of the candidate-associates and companions and celebrated a Eucharistic Liturgy. Candidate-associates and companions have already begun meeting, either in person, by phone, e-mail or in small groups.

“It is very exciting and inspiring to experience the enthusiasm among these women and men and the sisters,” said Sister Mary Alice.

Sister receives honors for alcohol treatment and education



Sister Pat Hauser traveled to Yakima, WA, from her home in Forks, WA, to be honored with the James Oldham Award by Sundown M Ranch. The award is named for the man who pioneered alcohol treatment and education in Yakima County. The plaque presented to Sister Pat reads “... for your pioneering spirit of alcoholism and chemical dependency treatment. Your knowledge and passion is a rich heritage for all of us.” Sister Pat served in ministry at the treatment center three times, as a part-time counselor loaned by Catholic Charities when Sundown opened 35 years ago, then as a full-time counselor and later as full-time chaplain about six years ago.

Ministry award for Sister of Providence

Dolores Ellwart, SP, received the ministry award from Bishop Michael Driscoll for her years of outstanding service on the Coeur d’Alene Reservation. Sister Dolores was born in DeSmet, Idaho, where she has served in ministry since 1965, when she was missioned to Mary Immaculate School. She taught all of the grades and served as superior and principal. When that school closed, she moved across the road to Sacred Heart Indian Mission, where she continues to serve as parish minister. Sister Dolores received the ministry award in October at the 2006 Fall Conference in the Diocese of Boise.

When someone knocks and asks the Sisters of Providence to serve, they answer, emcee Michael Hastings said as he presented the 2006 Harvester of Faith award to **Sister Rose Byrne** at the St. Finbar Harvest Ball in Burbank in October. "Sister Rose has been the heart and SOUL of Providence St. Joseph Medical Center for many years," Michael says. In addition to her work at St. Joseph's, she has been sister representative at Providence Holy Cross Medical Center and Providence St. Elizabeth's Care Center since 1998.

CDPs in San Antonio Host Weekend of Spiritual Healing

For many years, Moyer Retreat Center in Castroville, Texas, the former Motherhouse of the Sisters of Divine Providence, has served as a venue for spiritual growth and development. This winter it will be hosting an exciting new program called Mary's Hope to help survivors of child abuse heal from spiritual wounds caused by abuse. On February 22, 24 and 25, the Center will welcome survivors of child abuse, their companions and professionals that walk the journey of recovery with them, for a weekend of spiritual healing, provided by Mary's Hope.

Mary's Hope is designed for survivors, their companions, adoptive and foster parents, mental health professionals, victim service professionals, ministers, spiritual directors and pastoral service directors. Presented from a Judeo-Christian perspective and rooted in personal faith and healing journeys, the program deals with the spiritual healing and recovery from early childhood abuse and trauma.

The weekend's schedule consists of an information session, a workshop and a retreat, and is presented by Sherry Niermann and Reverend Diane Moore, founders of Mary's Hope.

If you know anyone who is a survivor, or who works with survivors of traumatic childhood abuse, please share this workshop information with him or her. Registration is required and forms are available at the Center or at www.moyecenter.org. Licensed personal counselors, such as psychologists and marriage and family therapists, can earn continuing education credits (CEUs) for attending Day 1 and Day 2 of the Mary's Hope program.

Sisters of Providence, Holyoke, Mass. Celebrate 30th Anniversary of Spiritual Life Center

Genesis Spiritual Life Center in Westfield, Massachusetts, observed its 30th Anniversary in 2006 and the 30th Anniversary of the Year End Retreats held there since its founding year.

Holyoke SPs **Elizabeth Oleksak** and **Ruth McGoldrick**, in keeping with their own Community's long tradition of ending each calendar year with a retreat, initially offered the Year End Retreats at Genesis for their own Providence Sisters. As time passed, they opened the retreats to all. To mark the retreat's 30th Anniversary, they invited presenters who have a special friendship with the Sisters of Providence and Genesis. This special retreat filled the retreat house to capacity and beyond.

On the retreat's closing morning, Sister Elizabeth found Sister Barbara Farrell's, SND, response to the question, "What do you most want to take home from Genesis and remember?" so moving she asked her to send it to her in writing. In that letter, Sister Barbara, a long time friend of Genesis and many Providence Sisters, shared her sentiments about Genesis and the Sisters of Providence. (Sister Barbara has conducted retreats at Genesis and is well known by many communities in the US and abroad.)

Sister Barbara wrote: "As I attempted to respond, I found the walls 'talking' and unexpected memories crowded in. Many years ago my aunt, Peggy O'Connor, was a volunteer in this place where the Sisters of Providence operated a home for unwed mothers. She often spoke about the atmosphere that was present: a spirit of warm hospitality, gracious service and a deeply felt climate of respect..."

"I came to recognize something very special among the Sisters of Providence. They listened to the needs of their time and responded to those needs in creative ways. They continued to listen and, when attitudes changed, to let go of what was to embrace the 'new deed' to which God called them.

"The same spirit that inspired this earlier venture prompted the creation of Genesis Spiritual Life Center and today we celebrate its 30th anniversary. The people and even the walls attest to the rich tradition of (the SPs') service. The Sisters of Providence have created a space that continues to provide so many ways of helping women and men expand their awareness of the meaning of spirituality. The spirit of that earlier time continues!

"I pray in gratitude for this group of women religious who today inspire me and many others to remain open to the Spirit, to let go of what is and remain on the cutting edge of service to the people of God. They trust in the Providence of God; I trust in the goodness of God. Both congregations rejoice in the presence and power of God that is at the center of our lives and our source of hope."
